

# Staffing Industry grew at 9.2% in Q222 & 23% YoY

### Staffing industry has bounced back with 9.2% Nett employment growth in Q222

Q222: ISF members represent 1.15 mn temp staff (in tripartite model).

- ISF members have provided employment to 2.15 lakhs new job seekers in last 4 Qtrs.

YoY (Q222 vs Q221): Staffing industry grew at 23% YoY (Q222 vs Q221)

- Post 2<sup>nd</sup> wave, Jul- Sept 2021 staffing industry bounced back with a robust Nett headcount growth at 9.2% in Q222.
- Same time last year post 1<sup>st</sup> wave impact, the industry was able to come out of Covid impacted employment at +1%.
- Nett headcount growth for staffing Industry (represented by ISF members) in the last 4 qtrs, has grown at **23**% significantly indicating the employment demand across sectors.
